

A Note from Our Executive Director



Dear Colleagues

NSL announced that profit before tax for the financial year 2017 declined 71% to \$5.1 million. The decline in profit before tax was mainly due to the weak performance by Precast business in Singapore, Malaysia and Dubai, notwithstanding the satisfactory performance of the PBU business in Finland which made significant profit contribution to the Group.

We achieved a turnover of \$356.2 million in FY2017, a 6% increase from \$337 million in FY2016.

Innovative Engineering Initiatives

As reported by Chairman in the letter to shareholders in our Annual Report 2017, the Group actively took advantage of its strength in engineering technology to improve its processes and develop new products and services to bring about higher productivity and better customer engagement respectively.

For Precast and PBU division, NSL Research and Development (NSL R&D) department worked with its Singapore Precast business to develop a lightweight concrete for its PBU system in 2017. The new PBU product which weighs about 40% lighter received a certificate of In-Principle Acceptances from the Building and Construction Authority, enabling it to broaden its PBU product offerings.

In line with the Singapore government's efforts to promote greater productivity through the use of technology in the construction sector, the division had also invested in Building Information Modeling IT system to facilitate better collaboration and more seamless information flow with various stakeholders across the construction value chain, resulting in greater operational efficiency.

NSL Chemicals commercialised a new low noise asphalt concrete mix using steel slag aggregate that was used in resurfacing a section of East Coast Parkway (ECP) expressway. This newly developed environmentally-friendly steel slag aggregate asphalt concrete mix is a collaborative effort between NSL R&D, local government agencies and tertiary institutions.

NSL Group is also committed to digitalise our business to improve overall operational efficiency and productivity. Digital technology was deployed in the Environmental Services division to ensure traceability of waste collection. The system empowered holistic automation scheduling, waste collection optimisation and vehicle route planning.

The Group has also started to employ data analytics in our business operations. Although, still in its infancy, data analytics has been applied to optimise manpower scheduling for business operations, enhance understanding of customers' preferences and track the effectiveness of marketing promotions, campaigns and events.

Looking forward, we will continue to leverage on digital technology and data analytics to improve our processes and to strengthen our competitive advantage and market share.

Thank you all for your contributions to the Group for the past year. In the year ahead, let's continue working together as a team to bring in better profit for the Group.

SL Group achieved a turnover of \$356.2 million in FY2017, a 6% increase from \$337.0 million in FY2016. The higher turnover was mainly due to Environmental Services division's newly acquired subsidiary in fuel management services business and the restructured Recycled Fuel Oil (RFO) business. Revenue generated by Precast & Prefabricated Bathroom Unit (PBU) division declined.

Profit before tax declined 71% to \$5.1 million in FY2017 as a result of the weak performance by Precast business in Singapore, Malaysia and Dubai, notwithstanding the satisfactory performance of the PBU business in Finland which made significant profit contribution to the Group.


After taking into account income tax and non-controlling interests, the Group reported a 69% drop in profit attributable to shareholders from continuing operations in FY2017, from \$13.9 million in FY2016 to \$4.4 million in FY2017.

Significant Events

The Precast & PBU division gained greater recognition for its efforts in promoting the development of environmentally sustainable buildings. The precast components of its Singapore and Malaysia operations were awarded the prestigious Singapore Green Building Product certification for 45 types of environmentally-friendly concrete mix in June 2017 and another 35 types in January 2018.

In response to the strong order book for its PBU business in Finland, the division leveraged its robotic tiling technology to expand its production capacity by 20% in FY2017.

During the year, the Environmental Services division rebuilt its fixation plant which was disrupted by a fire incident. The fixation plant would likely resume operations in the first quarter of 2018. The division also strengthened its business operations by deploying the internet of things



and digitalising its business processes. In addition, it upgraded its laboratory equipment to reinforce process control and treatment robustness.

The Environmental Services division successfully restructured its RFO business in 2017 by offering oily wastewater cleaning and removal services (deslopping) directly to its marine customers. The construction of the division's organic wastewater treatment facility in Tuas has commenced and is progressing on schedule for completion in 2018.

The fuel management services business of Environmental Services division was awarded a Marine Gas Oil Bunker supplier and Bunker Operator license by Maritime and Port Authority of Singapore during the year. With this license, the division can now offer its service to coastal marine customers directly, achieving a greater level of customer satisfaction through timelier and more transparent service deliveries with its automated fuel dispensing technology.

Looking Ahead

The Precast business as a whole is expected to remain challenging. The Singapore and Malaysia Precast operations are being restructured to improve cost competitiveness in the face of intense competition. Although the Dubai operation has a healthy order book, it is subject to risks of project delays. Business outlook for the PBU business in Finland is expected to remain favourable.

In the Environmental Services division, business outlook for recycled fuel oil (RFO) business continues to look positive driven by stronger performance of the restructured RFO business and the expected full resumption of the waste management services by March 2018.

Dividend

Subject to the approval of shareholders at the annual general meeting of the Company to be held on 24 April 2018, the Board is recommending a final dividend of \$0.05 per share for the financial year ended 31 December 2017 to be paid on or about 22 May 2018 or such other date to be determined by the Directors.

Precast & PBU

Review 2017

Performance

he Precast & Prefabricated Bathroom Unit (PBU) division's turnover declined by 12% to \$208.5 million in FY2017 compared to FY2016, mainly as a result of sluggish market demand as well as delays in precast projects in Singapore, Malaysia and Dubai. Average selling prices in Singapore remained weak due to intense competition from languishing private sector construction activities. However, its Finland PBU operation did well, driven by healthy demand for PBU in Finland and Sweden.

As a result of the losses made by its Singapore and Malaysia operations and lower profit from Dubai, profit before tax fell from \$25.4 million in FY2016 to \$2.9 million in FY2017 despite the significant profit contributions from Finland operations.



Development Highlights

Parmarine achieved full production loading for both its PBU and fire door plants in FY2017. Its PBU operating capacity successfully expanded by 20% in 2017 with an additional robotic automation equipment production line to cope with higher PBU demand in Scandinavia.

During the year, Dubai Precast LLC secured several prestigious projects, such as Dubai EXPO 2020, Jebel Ali Refinery pipe rack and tunnel segment for Dubai Metro Route 2020. In the Dubai Expo 2020 project, other than supplying and installing precast coloured concrete panels for EXPO 2020 Thematic District, the Company will also be supplying 40,000m² of hollow-core slabs for the shopping mall.

Dubai Precast LLC successfully completed its first precast concrete pipe rack project, consisting of columns and beams weighing up to 45 tons, for the expansion of Jebel Ali Refinery. Production and delivery of its first concrete tunnel segment project for Dubai Metro Route 2020 has commenced and is expected to be completed in 2019.

Eastern Pretech Malaysia secured its fourth IKEA warehouse project in Malaysia to design, supply and install precast components.



The Singapore construction market encountered headwind in 2017. Tenders were few and, as a result, highly competitive. Eastern Pretech Singapore maintained its focus on institutional and industrial projects, and won projects such as Integrated Care Hub, Global Switch and Google Phase 3.

Eastern Pretech Singapore obtained a certificate of In-Principle Acceptances from the Building and Construction Authority to manufacture a new and cost competitive range of drywall panels and lightweight concrete PBU systems for the Singapore market. Another key milestone during the year was the achievement of the prestigious Singapore Green Building Product certification for many types of its environmentally-friendly concrete mix, used in its precast components, in Eastern Pretech Singapore and Eastern Pretech (Malaysia). This award is a recognition of the companies' efforts in promoting the development of environmentally sustainable buildings.



Going Forward

The Precast business as a whole is expected to remain challenging. The Singapore and Malaysia Precast operations are being restructured to improve cost competitiveness in the face of intense competition. The Dubai operation has a healthy order book, but it is subjected to risks of project delays. Business outlook for the division's PBU business in Finland is expected to remain favourable.

Environmental Services Review 2017

Performance

urnover of Environmental Services division increased 65% from \$75.9 million in FY2016 to \$124.9 million in FY2017 on the back of a higher sales volume from its newly acquired subsidiary in the fuel management services business and Recycled Fuel Oil (RFO).

The division achieved a loss before tax of \$2.4 million in FY 2017. It would have turned around last year had it not been for the fire incident in March 2017 which disrupted its waste treatment business (for which our business interruption insurance claims have yet to be recognised). The improved performance of the division's restructured RFO business on the back of higher sales volume and price, profit contribution from its fuel management services business and reversal of impairment for property, plant and equipment uplifted the business.



Development Highlights

During the year, the Environmental Services division rebuilt its fixation plant which was disrupted by the fire incident. The fixation plant is likely to resume operations in the first quarter of 2018. It also strengthened its business operations by deploying the internet of things and digitalising its business processes. In addition, it upgraded its laboratory equipment to enhance process control and treatment robustness.

Its RFO business was successfully restructured in 2017 to offer oily wastewater cleaning and removal services (deslopping), and sell RFO directly to its customers. The division would continue to invest in plant, equipment and resources to grow its RFO business to increase its market share in 2018.

The construction of the division's organic wastewater treatment facility in Tuas has commenced and is progressing on schedule for completion in 2018. The new Tuas plant with an eventual wastewater treatment capacity of 1,000m³ per day is equipped with advanced treatment technologies that are capable of treating a wide range

of industrial wastewater to support Singapore's industrial promotion plan for the electronic and chemical clusters.

In November 2017, the division's fuel management business was awarded a Marine Gas Oil Bunker supplier and Bunker Operator license by Maritime and Port Authority of Singapore. With this license, the division can now offer its service directly to coastal marine customers, achieving a greater level of customer satisfaction through timelier and more transparent service deliveries with its automated fuel dispensing technology.

In a bid to improve the productivity of airport operations, the division introduced a customised AeroTruck with Radio-Frequency Identification smart dispensing system, which has features that are above the latest airport safety and security requirements of Changi Airport.

In the Environmental Services division, the business outlook for RFO business continues stronger performance of the restructured RFO business and the expected full resumption services by March 2018.





This enterprise provides MDAS members an opportunity to develop and enhance the skills of young adults during their employment. 1. When were you diagnosed with muscular dystrophy and how has MDAS supported you.

Since young I already knew that I was different from other children. I was weaker, could not walk for long and would fall over very easily. It was only at the age of 25 years that I was officially diagnosed with Spinal muscular dystrophy. At that point of time I was introduced to MDAS and they were my pillar of strength by providing me with a career path through BizPower.

2. How long have you been with BizPower and how have you benefited from this programme?

I have been with BizPower for 11 years and it was via this programme that I picked up designing skills. When I was initially introduced to it, I had no idea what digital art was and wanted to explore some possibilities to see

There are two main hurdles. Physically, I started feeling a little sore and weak accompanied by neck and shoulder pain. Mentally would be on brainstorming the concept of the card, once the ideas started pouring in, my indecisiveness kicked in. Every design appeared to be nice and shortlisting the ideal one was a tough challenge. I usually spent quite a fair bit of time at that stage.

Designing a card definitely takes time; it ranges from an hour to a couple of days depending on the elements in the card.

Eastern Pretech Malaysia Updates

IKEA Penang Project Update

KEA Penang has been the largest project for Eastern Pretech (Malaysia) Sdn Bhd (EPM) in recent months. As with all three previous IKEA stores, this is also constructed in precast by EPM. All structural components such as columns, beams, staircases, lift walls as well as staircase flights and landings are precast. Hollow-core slabs spanning 16m have been used for most areas. Due to heavier design loads compared to our previous projects, a large portion of the areas in IKEA Penang are converted from hollow core slabs to single-T slabs in this project.

Production of most of the components is being carried out at EPM's Beranang plant. A minor portion is produced in EPM's Sungai Petani plant, including the single-T slabs. The slabs are post-tensioned in the casting yard before delivery to site and to facilitate timely transportation of the components, a large site stockyard was arranged to store the components for easy transfer to the installation location.

Installation works commenced in November 2017 and by mid-February 2018 more than 80% of the components were produced and more than 50% were installed. Full installation works are targeted to be completed by the second half of April with the store expecting to open by early 2019.



EPM Clinches Sunway Big Box Village Project

PM has been chosen yet again by a reputable conglomerate, Sunway Group in Malaysia for the construction of its latest retail establishment, Sunway Big Box Village in Iskandar, Johor. The retail mall is about 500,000 sq ft in retail space and is scheduled for completion by 4Q2018.

EPM's scope of work includes the design, supply, delivery, installation of precast components and grouting works for a duration of six months. Production will be taking place at Seelong plant in Johor.

EP Receives Accreditation for Lightweight Concrete and Drywall PBUs

n the October 2017 issue of NSLink, we covered on Eastern Pretech Singapore (EP) being awarded the Certificate of Accreditation for Concrete PBU on 6 July 2017 by the Singapore Concrete Institute.

EP is pleased to announce that Building & Construction Authority has granted a certificate of In-Principle Acceptances (IPA) to both of EP's new PBU systems – Lightweight Concrete and Drywall panels on 6 December 2017.

To achieve this accreditation, EP had to fulfill seven new criterias in the assessment consisting submission of method statement, video of delivery and installation works, use of non-combustible materials, connection details between PBU and in-situ site construction to ensure fire safety compliance, water tightness and robustness, introduction of water storage heater tank in the PBU and submission of third party test reports on meeting the required codes for the two systems.






CNC Petroleum enters

s the largest bunkering port in the world; Singapore has one of the most stringent bunkering standards. This includes meeting proper documentations, equipment, procedures, quality of bunker fuel supplied and more.

This is an extension of CNC Petroleum's existing business supply diesel and other petroleum products by trucks to various non-maritime sectors in Singapore.

CNC Petroleum was the only new entrant in 2017, and is ranked 52 out of 55 licensed bunker suppliers in MPA's list. To deter malpractice and ensure that the most stringent standards are followed in Singapore's ports, MPA reviews these standards from time to time.

While securing its physical supplier licence is recent, delivering diesel to the marine industry is not new to them. They have been tapping through other bunker operators previously, and saw this as an opportunity to grow the business further.

With this accreditation, CNC Petroleum wants to increase customers' experience further. The subsidiary aims to enhance digitalisation of its business processes, emphasizing on transparency, accuracy and speed of delivery. "We will also tap on the internet of things; embarking on automated fuel tanking system and monitoring systems to optimise inventory; monitoring of fuel consumption for customers; retrieving business intelligence reports from analytics and so forth," elaborates Mr Sean Chua, CEO of NSL FMS. He also added that forging strong partnerships with oil majors is important to secure consistent volume and supply.

Fish for the **Freshest!**


n 11 February, just four days before Lunar New Year, over 40 employees across the subsidiaries in Singapore had a chance to fish for their keep!



3 Types of Primary Headaches

Primary headaches include migraines, tension-type headaches, and cluster headaches. The Department of Neurology at National Neuroscience Institute (NNI) shares the symptoms of 3 primary headaches.



Primary and secondary headaches - what's the difference?

Migraines, cluster headaches and tension-type headaches are primary headaches, while secondary headaches are due to an underlying problem in the head or neck, including bleeding in the brain, infections, brain tumour, or meningitis and encephalitis.

Here are some pointers to help you identify the type of primary headache you may have:

Migraine

An important cause of primary headaches, a migraine is an episodic, disabling headache that can last between a few hours and a few days.

According to the Department of Neurology, National Neuroscience Institute (NNI), a member of the SingHealth group, migraines are more common among women, with headache episodes occurring more frequently during the perimenstrual period, as a result of changes in oestrogen hormone levels during the menstrual cycle. Premenstrual migraines occur during or after the time when the female hormones, oestrogen and progesterone, decrease to their lowest levels.

Symptoms of migraine include:

- 1. Intense throbbing and pulsating pain
- Unilateral pain that begins or remains on just one side of the head
- 3. Nausea or vomiting
- 4. Sensitivity to stimuli such as lights, sounds and smells
- May be aggravated by physical activities, especially coughing or bending over
- 6. May be preceded by flashing lights
- 7. May be associated with visual symptoms, such as seeing zigzag lines
- 8. Tingling, numb or cold limbs

Tension Headache

This is the most common type of primary headache, occurring in up to 90 per cent of adults in their lifetime.

The exact cause of a tension headache is not known, although physical and emotional stress can cause the muscles that cover the skull to contract and cause pain.

Tension headaches are more common among women than men, especially among those with high stress levels.

Symptoms of a tension headache include:

- Pain that feels like a tight band pressing around the head, with the most intense pressure over the eyebrows
- 2. Pain is usually mild, dull and steady, not throbbing or disabling, and bilateral (affecting both sides of the head)
- 3. No nausea or vomiting associated with the headache
- 4. Occurs sporadically (infrequently and without a pattern), but can also occur frequently or even daily

Cluster Headache

A rare type of primary headache (about 0.1 per cent incidence) more common among men in their late 20s, although cluster headaches can also occur among women and children.

Symptoms of a cluster headache include:

- Headache attack often wakes patient from sleep at a similar time every night
- Pain always occurs on the same side, usually over one eye, which causes tearing and redness of the eye.
